AFRICA AMINI ALAMA **ANNUAL REPORT 2022-2023**

In the last fifteen years Africa Amini Alama – literally translated "Africa, I believe in you" - has brought about many miracles, large and small. A 4-year-old, shy toddler grows into a self-confident secondary school pupil. A Maasai woman is saved, just in time, from a serious illness thanks to a gynaecological examination. A single woman can again provide for herself and her children thanks to her being part of a chicken farm project. A teacher employed by us for many years breaks new ground in school teaching with his newly acquired knowledge. It is these countless individual stories that touch the heart.

The impact of our work can be quantified, measured qualitatively and evidenced by strategies and visions. But in the end, what counts are the individual lives we have changed for the better. We experience every day what faith and trust (Amini) can achieve. Faith grows, and with each supporter, the possibility to bring about more miracles.

This 2022/23 report gives a comprehensive overview of the status of all the projects currently active in Africa Amini Alama. There is much to report. And whilst we inevitably talk about buildings and construction, we know that it is not so much the buildings themselves that are important to mention, but the power, love and joy that they help us create in our communities here.

In the past year, we achieved the following infrastructure milestones:

- In January 2022, 40 students were admitted to the Africa Amini Secondary School for Sustainable Tourism for the first time and have now completed their first school year.
- In May, the new Africa Amini Healing Clinic was opened, which, in addition to preventative medicine and naturopathy, also provides treatment for patients in communities and schools as part of the Driving Doctors project.
- In September, construction began on the Mukuru Primary School, which will open up a new Maasai area and provide much-needed food and Englishlanguage education there.
- In October, we started with regenerative agriculture and an intensification of our permaculture program within the framework of the Africa Amini - Earth project.
- At the end of the school year, all pupils in the final year of primary school were given a small oven for wood-saving cooking.
- Before year end, the new Simba Vision classroom building was opened and the renovation of the teachers' living units and the kitchen was completed.
- Thirty new Buffalo bicycles have been made available to staff and students since November.





- The Lendoiya School got a new sanitary unit.
- In January 2023, we opened our third secondary school with a focus on regenerative agriculture, Kilimo Secondary School in Oltepes.
- In February 2023, a water pipeline was built in Kisimiri Juu for a catchment area of 3000 Maasai.
- At Maasai Vision, thanks to the two new boarding units, the fourth and seventh grade students are able to stay overnight at the school.

We focused on delivering food to communities who were suffering from acute famine. Especially in times of severe drought and food shortages, this emergency aid was urgently needed. We supported single women who are now able to sustain themselves thanks to small business projects.

We looked at our internal structure, investing in our own human resources. Working to improve communication and skill sharing amongst our leadership team, more than 20 project leaders now take part in our management team meetings. All employment contracts, roles and responsibilties, and the organisation chart have been updated.

In Africa Amini Life, we saw a significant rise in the number of guests after the difficult Covid affected years. We have sought to further improve the service offered at the Original Maasai Lodge and also expanded the offering at Hillside Retreat which now operates as a lodge with a new reception, more rooms and a manager. In addition, our offering at Amini Homes allows guests an overnight stay in the very heart of our projects.

If these few lines have aroused curiosity, then let me take you even deeper into the world of Africa Amini Alama in this Annual Report 2022-2023.





1. **MEDICAL PROJECTS:**

1.1. OUR VISION AND MISSION

Our vision is to offer access to health by encouraging not only restoration of physical strength & wellbeing but also by changing mindsets and drawing on our capacity to self-heal. We aim to help people with limited time and resources in the healing and prevention of illness by integrating conventional medicine and naturopathy.

We see ourselves as a centre where preventative medical education and treatment strategies, as well as comprehensive naturopathic services, create a field of healing for those people in Tanzania who cannot afford it. This holistic approach can be integrated into the healthcare system and medical staff can be trained in it.

Some examples of what our patients say about the medical centre:

"At this centre, I feel that my problems have been recognised"

"I now know what is wrong with me!"

"The therapies and herbal remedies have brought me back into balance not only physically, but also emotionally!"

1.2. POLYCLINIC WITH PREVENTATIVE MEDICINE AND NATUR-**OPATHIC CENTRE**

In 2020, when the legal agreements came to an end, the Africa Amini Hospital was handed over to the state. In addition to the HIV and tuberculosis outpatient clinic, the hospital is now of great importance for acute emergency care and for mothers giving birth. We continue to support women at the hospital with free mother-child packages.

Our focus, however, is now on our new polyclinic focussing on preventative medicine. Here we combine conventional medical care and diagnostics with naturopathic therapies.

The Preventative Medicine Clinic was built by the Saint Lucy Foundation and consists of a laboratory, ultrasound, gynaecology, ophthalmological unit, wound care unit and dentist's unit. We treat people not only from the immediate vicinity but also from





remote areas. With the medical education and training seminars which we offer at the clinic, in schools and out in the village communities, we aim to create health awareness among people of all ages.

After an initial diagnosis and treatment based on conventional medicine, African herbal medicine, homeopathy, vital field therapy, Scenar, acupuncture, medical massages, as well as specially prepared mixtures and remedies find their equal standing in the naturopathic clinic. If necessary, therapeutic-healing interventions can be re-applied to address deeper causes of the disease. Patients who are being treated for pain also receive support and help by way of physiotherapy. This broadbased, integrated approach to healing is widely accepted by the local population. We source local medicinal plants from our permaculture-project for the treatment of our patients and generate awareness of pesticide-free food cultivation.



















1.3. FACTS AND FIGURES AFRICA AMINI - HEALING CLINIC 2022-2023


Our center provides free access to basic diagnostic and treatment for all patients... Thus, families with financial problems can contact us a point of contact us at an early stage of the disease. The costs for special examinations, medicines and naturopathic remedies come at some costs but whomever cannot afford them will get an exemption from our social worker. Our basic principle is that no one should leave the clinic without adequate treatment.

Enclosed is an overview of the patient numbers in the last 12 months (May 2022 to April 2023). A total of 9028 patients were treated in the clinic.

4,413 patients, hence nearly half of them were exempted from treatment costs.

Every Wednesday, a Driving Doctors team (consisting of a social worker, a nurse, a doctor, an optometrist and a dentist) travel to surrounding communities and schools to provide health education, diagnostics and treatment. In the last 11 months, 4,786 patients have been reached. Due to the rainy season and the intensive planting season in the area, as well as the Easter holidays in the schools, we did not go to the communities in April. Those patients who need more intensive care are transported to our clinic or to the Momella Health Centre.









We are particularly proud to still cooperate closely with the, now state-run, Momella Health Centre which was initially set up and then run by Africa Amini for 10 years. Thanks to the distribution of free mother-child packages (an average of 50 packages) per month) to pregnant women via our clinic, the number of births in the neighbouring hospital has more than doubled. The women can thus give birth in good hygienic conditions or, if necessary, have their child delivered by caesarean section. The cost of these birth packages, which every woman has to bring with her to a hospital, was often a barrier to a woman going to a hospital to give birth.

At present, a motivated, multidisciplinary team of 30 employees actively works together for the benefit of the patients. Weekly training enables the team to gain interdisciplinary knowledge and experience in naturopathy. The team enjoy a weekly yoga session and also gather on a Thursday evening for joint sports activities. Eight of our employees, who come to the clinic every day on a bicycle borrowed from Africa Amini, act as role models for our patients. Patients feel the cohesion in our team and appreciate the caring, interdisciplinary diagnosis and treatment.










Thanks to our patient information system, workflows can now be simplified, comprehensive patient data can be stored and clear statistics compiled. For example, we can calculate exactly how many patients were diagnosed with which diseases at the clinic in any one year.

2. **EDUCATION PROJECTS:**

2.1. OUR VISION AND MISSION

Our vision is that children and young people are given the tools to shape their own lives through the transfer of knowledge and the acquisition of practical skills.

We achieve this through the establishment and maintenance of English speaking Primary Schools as well as Secondary Schools for children from poor families. In these schools, in addition to the students acquiring knowledge, creativity and independent thinking, we aim to raise them to become responsible members of their communities. A Vocational Tourism Secondary School and our other vocational schools teach adolescents a trade in order to integrate them into a stable working environment as early as possible.

What our students say about their training:

"We are the generation of the future."

"We have learned to act confidently, think critically and to follow the call of our hearts."

"Soon we will be successful in our professional lives and pass on what we have received."

In 2022/23, we focussed on ensuring that all our schools complied with our quality standards. An internal Quality School Management Team, consisting of four teachers from our schools, spends a day in each of the Africa Amini Alama schools twice a year. They prepare a comprehensive report on each school which includes the results of their audit, the outcome of discussions with the students and suggestions for improvement for the respective schools.

The two-week intervention for all schools in March 2023 organised by Michael Peters and Tal Asher was particularly helpful. In addition to seminars with the teachers, each school was visited individually and selected classes were audited. A report shows how much the quality of education has improved in the last few years, but the implementation of our own quality standards, especially on the part of the state teachers, continues to be a great challenge.

In 2020, Kick for Life started intensive football training at Pamoja Secondary School. This expanded to all schools in 2022. Sports coordinator and football coach, Lazaro, now not only teaches in all our secondary schools, but also trains a team of selected pupils interested in football in the primary schools.








2.2. AN UPDATE ON THE INDIVIDUAL PRIMARY SCHOOLS

Two graphs illustrate how many pupils receive a good education, food and a new perspective on life thanks to Africa Amini Alama. In 2023, we now have 1,709 children in primary schools.









2.2.1. MAASAI VISION ENGLISH MEDIUM PRIMARY SCHOOL

With a teaching team of 9 private and 6 government employed teachers, Massai Vision was our first primary school and now has 2 Montessori kindergarten classes, 7 primary classes and a total of 303 students. When we started the first class in 2011, the Maasai community at that time could hardly be persuaded to send their girls to school. Maasai boys were allowed to attend school because of the food we provided. This has now changed fundamentally. Our clear ratio of 50:50 girls and boys, as well as the visible success of the pupils, now motivates all parents to send their children to school. Teacher Beatrice, our Africa Amini coordinator, and the team of private teachers, work hand in hand with the state teachers. We are proud to say that this school was awarded best government primary school in the district in 2022. However, we still want to make learning easier for those children who have to take national exams in the fourth and seventh grade and want to do this through the provision of a boarding unit for the pupils. The request came from the children themselves, as an overnight stay at the school means they cannot be kept from learning by daily household chores. In 2022, to address the lack of water in the area, we renovated the vegetable garden that had been there for years. In addition to a new fence, we installed a drip irrigation system with recycling of waste water from the kitchen hand basin. In this way, the water serves two purposes, both for the children with their hygiene and for the plants.







2.2.2. WORSEG VISION ENGLISH MEDIUM PRIMARY SCHOOL

At Worseg Vision, 11 private and 6 state teachers teach a total of 377 students. We run 3 Montessori classes and 7 primary classes in this school. Our children from the KinderVilla also attend this school, which is located close to them. In 2022, the children in 7th grade of Worseg Vision, as well as all students in the graduating classes of the other Africa Amini schools, received their own small stove. A gift that will enable the poorest families in the area to cook with less smoke and less wood consumption. The stoves were ceremoniously handed over to the 40 students at the end-of-year party. This year we enjoyed the presence of Artur Worseg, who came especially for the celebration.

School coordinator Moses is proud that the sports field behind Worseg Vision has also become a gathering place for sports activities in the surrounding community. Although it is only a lawn with two iron goals, it is used not only during school hours, but also in the afternoons and weekends by various staff and students for their sporting activities.











2.2.3. SIMBA VISION ENGLISH MEDIUM PRIMARY SCHOOL

After two years of construction, the new school building, funded by the Swiss Waser Foundation and eagerly awaited by 313 children, was opened at Simba Vision at the end of 2022. The design, based on the architectural needs of Montessori classes, is focussed particularly on enabling inclusive learning. With a staircase unlike anything Maasai children have ever seen in their lives, the students love to play there even during breaks, transforming the space into a playground.

The 10 private teachers and the 4 state teachers are particularly grateful for the newly created teacher housing units in the premises of the old classroom buildings. It allows them to live in close proximity to the children. Teacher coordinator, Lucas, supports the vision of bringing Montessori education into the primary age classes; a completely new concept for Tanzanian government schools. He appreciates the new volunteer units and welcomes volunteer teachers from abroad in his school. The newly built kitchen unit used to provide porridge for breakfast and lunch is also particularly helpful. A water tower with a special filter system enables the children to have clean water for meals and to cover their need for drinking water during school hours.

Liesl and Norbert Bergold visited the project regularly over the last two years in order to organise lessons together with the teachers and to ensure the best communication possible with the children's sponsors. During these sponsorship trips, guests were able to enter into a new sponsorship agreement and existing sponsors were able to gain a special insight into the everyday life of the children they support.

The new regenerative agriculture project developed within the framework of Africa Amini Earth, on one hectare of land next to the school, is a good opportunity to make the pupils aware of the need for new agricultural techniques at an early age. The lectures given in each primary school by Paolo, our permaculture specialist, provide the theoretical basis for creating a new awareness here.









2.2.4. MUKURU PRIMARY SCHOOL

In 2022, Christine brought this school into the Africa Amini Alama fold in order to provide basic food for the children from this remote Maasai area. In the meantime, thanks to the help of Sophie Hausherr of the McPike-Zima Foundation, the school has been completely renovated, new classrooms built and an English-speaking kindergarten class started.

At the moment, seven pupils have made it to secondary school, but it will take a little more patience and a few more years of good teaching to raise the standard of education and give all children a real chance for a better future.





2.2.5. LENDOIYA PRIMARY SCHOOL

This school, which has been supported by Africa Amini for more than three years. Located not far from Momella, it has gained the status of an English Medium School through the parents' own initiative. Persistent negotiations by the community and using Africa Amini's support for the renovation of the classrooms, new class buildings, textbooks and four private teachers, made this re-designation possible. Here too however, one of the foremost functions which the school can provide in a year of drought and meagre harvests, is the daily help it gives by providing school meals for 284 children. Without school meals, the children have to be sent home at 12 noon and many of them are not provided with enough food.

Anna, the school coordinator, is particularly thankful for the newly built sanitary units, which have contributed to better hygiene conditions in the school.









2.2.6. OLTEPES PRIMARY SCHOOL

Oltepes Primary School is an English-language school built by the Maasai community in the immediate vicinity of the Original Maasai lodge. With the growing willingness of parents to send their children to school, the capacity at the two schools run by Africa Amini is no longer sufficient. A new community initiative such as this is worthy of support. We help with food, the construction of classrooms, school furniture and two private teachers. The Ndoto Foundation from Switzerland is helping us. At the beginning of 2023, a new Montessori class was also started here at the request of the parents. Currently, the 4 state and 2 private teachers teach 185 children. Teacher, Glory, is responsible for the Montessori class and is also the coordinator in respect of Africa Amini's involvement.











2.3. AN UPDATE ON SECONDARY SCHOOLS

Each year, the number of primary school students sponsored by Africa Amini who meet all the necessary criteria to be admitted to secondary school, grows. Thus, the expansion of the secondary school sector has been one of our priorities in recent years.

In addition to the Pamoja Secondary School, in the last two years the Africa Amini Secondary School for Sustainable Tourism and the Kilimo Secondary School for Regenerative Agriculture have been established.














2.3.1. PAMOJA SECONDARY SCHOOL

Pamoja School of Excellence was awarded 2022 Best Government Secondary School within the Arumeru District. In December, we held our first graduation ceremony, celebrating the graduation of our first 80 proud, secondary school students. Many of them will start Pamoja High School in July 2023. After completion of the new boarding units in summer 2022, all requirements were met by Africa Amini for registration as a high school. And just in time for the start in July, Pamoja has now been officially declared a high school. Successful completion of the two high school classes will enable the students to qualify for admission to university.

As well as taking part in their ongoing secondary school classes, those students who were awaiting high school or college places in July, did not rest idle! Twelve of them were able to attend a solar technology course organised by Nikko-PV for 7 weeks. They learned the practical installation of solar systems as well as the theoretical basics of designing and calculating a solar generation system. This knowhow will definitely help them in their future professional life. Other students used the time by tutoring their younger colleagues, giving seminars on contraception and hygiene in government schools, or helping with other projects for career orientation. I was sent the following letter which shows how much these students are dedicated to contributing to the wellbeing of their communities.





Currently, 386 students attend Pamoja Secondary School and are taught by 11 government and 9 private teachers.

Additional extra-curricular activities remain an integral part of the education provided. In addition to sports activities, students also participated in the environmental club (in April 2023 alone, during the rainy season, 300 trees were planted in the school grounds), the girl's club, the computer club to teach interested students about programming (a project supported by our foundation in the USA) and many other creative activities, such as dance and drama.





2.3.2.AFRICA AMINI SECONDARY SCHOOL FOR SUSTAINABLE TOURISM

As the first vocational secondary school with a focus on sustainable tourism, it gives children from the poorest backgrounds professional skills in the field of tourism in addition to completing the standard school curriculum. With their school-leaving certificate after 4 years, they have the best possible chance of immediately joining the labour market.

In 2022, the first 40 students successfully completed their first school year. During the holidays they had the opportunity to perfect their skills in tourist related businesses and to get deeper career insights into possible future roles.

As part of their training, they also serve and cook for Africa Amini guests or visitors from the national park under the Africa Amini Tree. With a smile, sometimes confident, sometimes still a little reserved, they grow in stature and experience from participating in these daily challenges.

This school also acts as a pilot project in terms our own sustainability and teaching others how to live more sustainably. From the permaculture garden to the care of their self-planted trees to the plastic recycling plant and the briquette machine, many items are deliberately integrated into the school curriculum in order that we can put sustainable concepts into practice.

This is our first private school. It provides boarding and employs only private teachers: 6 in secondary education and 4 for vocational school subjects.

Thanks to this new concept, Africa Amini was given the official status of a college. This will also help us with other vocational concepts, such as our other new secondary school for which we have chosen regenerative agriculture as an additional focus.







2.3.3.KILIMO SECONDARY SCHOOL FOR REGENERATIVE AGRICULTURE

Kilimo Secondary School in Oltepes Massailand provides students with a four-year secondary education with a focus on regenerative agriculture. We are breaking new ground in permaculture, reforestation and cereal farming to regenerate soils, produce healthy food and bring about changes in the microclimate.

After the school was opened in January 2023 by Moving Mountains, a Dutch foundation, the first 40 students started class. They also stay overnight at the school. They follow the normal secondary school curriculum in the morning and are busy in the afternoon in their newly planted permaculture garden, with the fruit trees and their own maize and bean field. In addition to practical skills, we also developed a curriculum in regenerative agriculture that does not yet exist in Tanzania. This will be, officially submitted to the Tanzanian authorities by the end of 2023. Africa Amini is helping in this initial stage with 2 teachers for secondary education and 1 teacher for technical education in agriculture.










2.4. AN UPDATE ON THE VOCATIONAL SCHOOLS:



AFRICA AMINI FUNDI CENTRE 2.4.1.

The Fundi Centre offers training courses for masons, carpenters, welders and mechanics. Here, 95 young people from socially disadvantaged families receive 2-year vocational training under the supervision of 8 vocational school teachers.

In 2022, the new boarding school and classroom building was completed, enabling us to also accommodate students who come from remote Maasai areas. In the last two years, the students worked on school furniture and bunk beds and built houses for families in need. Some goat houses for single women were also made by our students. It is always touching to see how these students, after only two years of training, and often without a school diploma, find a job in a short time that enables them and their families to survive.









2.4.2. TAILORING VOCATIONAL TRAINING SCHOOL

Our tailoring workshop, which boasts its own independent production facility, is where young girls complete a 2-year tailoring course and gain an official qualification. The women's sewing group runs the workshop as a standalone profit centre. In 2022 and 2023, Reinhild Wendl, who supports this project, visited Momella several times to provide technical support to her 20 girls and the women's group. As part of the sponsor trip she organised, this year she was also accompanied by supporters of her project.

In April this year, we also initiated a scheme to impart knowledge to the pupils of all the Africa Amini schools. In intensive seminars, the tailoring students taught their peers how to darn holes in school uniforms and sew on buttons.



2.4.3. AFRICA AMINI COMPUTER SCHOOL

Our computer school has 10 workstations where primary and secondary school children, as well as adults from the local community, can acquire basic IT skills in a three-month course. In addition, in 2022, a group of interested students was formed to learn more about website design and programming. This computer course is supported by our foundation in the USA.







2.5. SPONSORSHIPS

Many people have already taken responsibility for a child's education at Africa Amini through our sponsorship programme. Noemi was again on site for six months to better organise effective communication between sponsors and students. With a total of 1,107 ongoing sponsorships, this is a big administrative task. In addition to sponsorship reports, which are sent out twice a year, annual Zoom meetings and the possibility to visit the sponsored child on site, we want to enable transparency and an exchange between sponsor "parents" and the children they support.

Below are some statistics relating to existing sponsorships but also those 434 children who are still in need of a sponsor.











3. **SOCIAL PROJECTS**

3.1. VISION AND MISSION

Our vision: To share part of our wealth with those who are struggling to survive.

We help families in need until they are able to support themselves again. Through sponsorships of their own projects, we enable women to support themselves financially and to thrive whilst raising their children.

What people in need say about us:

"Without the quick help I would not have survived with my children!"

"I was able to build my own project and now I can feed my children myself!"

3.2. UPDATE ON THE CHILDREN'S VILLA

Our KinderVilla offers children a home; a home where our younger and now older children experience a warm togetherness, security and joy, as well as learning all the necessary social and life skills. In addition to a sound academic education at Worseg Vision and Pamoja Secondary School, we attach great importance to our children growing up in a loving and creative environment.

Last year, they received valuable input and lots of warmth and interaction from our volunteers during excursions, homework, sports activities, games or simply when preparing dinner together. This exchange with a completely different culture helps our children to build bridges that enable them to have a completely different future.

In 2022, 34 children lived permanently at the KinderVilla, three of whom were newcomers. Another 14 children board at the Pamoja School and visit their Kindervilla home at regular intervals on weekends and during holidays. In 2023 there are 25 children in the KinderVilla, 22 of their siblings in the Pamoja and Deborah at the Kilimo Secondary School.

Our orphanage father, Deo, acts as coordinator and confidante, making sure he finds the time to respond to the individual needs of his children. Together with three other staff members, they live with the children like an extended family.







3.3. UPDATE- EMERGENCY SUPPORT FOR FAMILIES IN NEED.

In 2022 especially, with the failed rains and almost non-existant crop output, it was difficult for many families to survive. In these most difficult of situations, we helped with bridging aid in the form of relief packages. Food was also brought to the communities as part of our Driving Doctors outreach programme. In some months, this meant providing up to 600 kg of maize and 400 kg of beans per week. In addition, we helped single women to build or finish their houses, gave them financial start-up aid for their own small business initiatives, helping them to start a chicken farm or giving them goats as a start-up aid for an independent life.










In view of last year's famine, here is a summary of the food we gave to children in schools and families in need in 2022: 80 tonnes of maize, 30 tonnes of beans as staple food items were our priority, followed by 11 tonnes of rice and 9500 litres of sunflower oil.



AFRICA AMINI EARTH 4.

Africa Amini has a strong connection to nature and a deep respect for the environment. Our aim in all projects is to show new ways of working within a sustainable concept in which the treasures of nature are treated with respect. In recent decades, natural resources, as a central part of our lives, have been neglected in various areas. Our planet therefore needs us to take measures which enable regeneration. With Africa Amini Earth we create an awareness of the value of African plants and for the need to respect nature. Our children and patients learn how to grow healthy food and they benefit from it every day to stay strong.

These are some of our principles

- Respect for nature and people as part of the environment
- Biodiversity and social integration
- Healing through natural resources
- Education as a central element of the sustainable process
- Original African food and healing remedies





4.1. PERMACULTURE:

In our gardens located in the schools, the Natural Healing Clinic and the fields of Ngabobo, vegetables have been grown organically for over ten years. Planting and maintaining the gardens are part of primary and secondary school education. The aim is to create an awareness and respect for natural resources.



4.2. MEDICINAL PLANTS:

For many years now, we have been using African natural medicine as an integral part of our approach to health and healing. With the opening of the natural healing clinic in 2022, this aspect remains a key element of our work. We work closely with herbal medicine practitioners from Meru and Maasai land to learn from the knowledge of their ancestors.





4.3. REGENERATIVE AGRICULTURE:

Due to food shortages, rising food prices and the high use of chemicals in agriculture, we are cultivating our own farmland to produce healthy staple foods for our school children. This is a necessity, but the project, which was launched in October, has a much broader significance. We want to encourage people to follow suit and pass on





our knowledge to the next generation. That is why we started the new Oltepes Kilimo Secondary School for regenerative agriculture, enabling us to teach these now forgotten techniques, to our older primary and secondary school students. We use home-made fertiliser and plants like neem leaves to control pests. By planting different types of crops in the immediate vicinity, we rely on synergies between the plants and place a lot of emphasis on the reintroduction of old cereal varieties. Fields near Simba Vision in Madebe, in Kilimo Secondary School, in Kiteto and since 2023 also in Maroroni serve as pilot farms for the regenerative cultivation of cereals, maize and beans. We want to break new ground; give the Maasai and Meru peoples alternatives which allow a respectful use of natural resources and encourage them to return to their original traditions.





4.4. AGROFORESTRY

In addition to growing crops, we are increasingly aware of the need to sustain and cultivate one of the most important resources on our planet: trees, recognising their central role in the micro-regulation of a particular area. Over 1000 trees have already been planted and nurtured by Africa Amini in 2022 and 2023, whether as a boundary to our fields, to keep out the wind and clean the water from the irrigation canals, for shade or to harvest fruit for the children. We grow trees in all our schools and also use them to garner medicinal herbs. It is touching to see how many of our children have already adopted this way of thinking in various projects and enthusiastically take responsibility for the trees we plant.









5. THE AFRICA AMINI ALAMA TEAM IN TANZANIA

Many of our staff members have worked alongside each other for several years now, journeying together through many joyful moments but also some difficult situations too. We draw from a pool of people with a wide range of skills. In order to use these skills to maximum effect for the benefit of the organisation, we empower and encourage our project managers to exchange views and offer solutions to current issues during our management meetings, which are held every two months.

At the instigation of our employees, we now have a regular sporting event in which all employees are invited to engage in different sporting activities, have fun and give air to their competitive side! Called Bonanza, our aim is to encourage our staff to participate in sporting activities across the organisation. An Africa Amini football team also trains weekly to put their skills to the test in future district championships.

Since November 2022, thirty bicycles have been available for local use by our employees and students. For example, vocational students who need to get to their places of work, our medical team to shorten their journey home, or students who want to visit the market on Fridays.

"Give a smile" is another touching initiative started by our social work team. Every employee is allowed to give clothes that he/she no longer urgently needs to our social work team, who take the clothes from families during their visits and distribute them to people who need them. With the help of a WhatsApp group, the generous clothing donor can see how much joy he/she brings with his/her donation. Tanzania helps Tanzania.

For me, these initiatives are a reflection of how much the vision of Africa Amini has been adopted and is being lived by our team of over 280 employees. Helping and bringing joy is contagious!
